Red & White Appeal update and opening

State-of-the-art haematology day case unit now open

Wednesday 28th August 2013 saw the official opening of the haematology day case unit by Lady Brabourne, President of Southampton Hospital Charity. This modern unit has been designed purely with the needs of haematology patients in mind and was made possible through the resolute fundraising of the Red and White Appeal.

The Red and White Appeal was launched over four years ago and through the enthusiasm and commitment of all our supporters, patients with blood conditions such as leukaemia and other life-threatening blood cancers can be treated efficiently, in comfort and without fear of infection.

Southampton Hospital Charity has seen tireless fundraising and a generous stream of donations from individuals and local companies to smash the £1.76m target reached ahead of time and allow this exceptional unit to become a reality with patients now fully utilising its fantastic facilities.

Previously, patients had to go to another area of Southampton General Hospital and share facilities with patients suffering from solid tumour cancers. Overcrowded clinics were putting blood cancer patients, who have low immune systems, at risk of more infections that could seriously compromise their recovery.

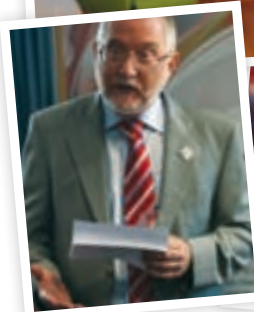
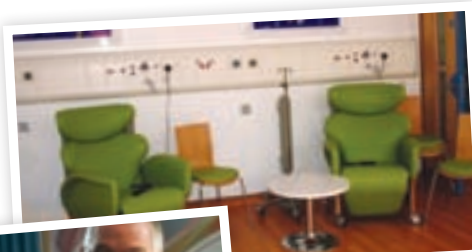
The new unit has been carefully thought out at every stage to ensure patients' needs are fully served in comfortable and pleasant surroundings. Located adjacent to the haematology inpatient facility, the new day case unit offers a more integrated approach to treatment and continuity



of care for patients. It will especially make a tremendous difference to the lives of those who visit regularly, each time for several hours.

Supporters of the Red & White Appeal who attended the official opening were delighted to see inside the unit for the first time. They were immediately met with bright colours, lots of space and an overwhelming recognition that every detail in the design of the unit has been fully considered to ensure patients are put at ease during their visit and that staff can work efficiently.

Joan Newman, clinical nurse specialist, said: "We're excited that this dream has now come to fruition and we're able to seamlessly offer the best care possible throughout our patients' treatment in a new, bright and comfortable environment. So many people have supported the appeal and we want to send them our heartfelt thanks as the creation and completion of the new unit would not have been possible without them."



In loving memory Dolls houses raise £12,000

Supporter John Gardner has donated the proceeds from the sale of four dolls houses that were restored by his recently deceased wife, Doreen.

Doreen Gardner began restoring dolls houses around 1975. She was self-taught and by the time she passed away she had restored over 50 dolls houses and was well known locally for her work. The restoration of dolls houses is an intricate operation that involves taking the house back to its original condition. She worked on both wooden and plastic dolls houses that dated back from the 1700's to the end of the Second World War. When she died, she left 12 beautifully restored dolls houses.

Most dolls houses Doreen worked on were found unfurnished. She would restore one house at a time, removing paint and wallpaper to replace with appropriate décor. She would always be looking out for furniture for up to four houses at a time from fairs, markets and houses. Doreen would make the curtains, find kitchen utensils, dress the dolls, cut out new rugs whilst John, originally in forestry, would help with any woodwork that was required, such as repairing wooden bars and the roofs.

John said: "My favourite pieces in Doreen's dolls houses have always been the ivory bone mice and cats that she would put in every kitchen of each house she worked on."

The tallest house is a staggering 6ft tall and dates back to around 1780. Acquired from the Countess of Antrim this type of dolls house was known as a baby house and they were used to teach young girls how to run a home.

John continued: "I still work and I have a pension, so I don't need the money from the sale of the houses. Doreen was treated at Southampton University Hospital with 2 strokes and so I have chosen to donate the proceeds from the sale

of the houses to Southampton Hospital Charity. The money is going to various wards and departments around the hospital, including the children's wards and the Red & White Appeal!"

"It's amazing the work that Doreen would put into each house; she had such patience and a keen eye for detail. The houses can sell for between £40 up to £4000! I will keep three of the houses but the rest will be sold and the money donated to the hospital charity."



Rapid access to treatment for patients thanks to new scanner

Children who visit our paediatric rheumatology ward are now able to benefit from more rapid access to treatment, thanks to a new ultrasound scanner.



The scanner, costing **£27,000**, has been financed entirely from charitable funding and is able to provide instant diagnosis for children with symptoms of rheumatic conditions. This then means our doctors are able to administer the treatment they need there and then.

Sarah Hartfree, paediatric rheumatology specialist nurse, said: "Rheumatic conditions can be very difficult to diagnose from symptoms alone, which is why an ultrasound scan is often necessary to properly assess the problem in order to provide effective treatment.

"In some cases, this would have meant the patient attending three separate appointments prior to receiving any treatment, but now we are able to provide diagnosis and treatment in the same day."

After identifying this opportunity to improve their patients' experiences, the paediatric rheumatology staff raised almost **£28,000** to fund a new ultrasound scanner, as well as training for staff to use it.

The money was raised through a series of events including a sponsored bike ride, bake sales and a charity gala, which on its own raised **£11,000** for the cause.

"Seeing how much of an impact the new scanner has had has only spurred us on to raise more money for the ward," said Sarah.

"We already have plans coming together for a number of fundraising activities in the near future, with the long-term goal of funding a psychotherapist and a physiotherapist to help improve patient experience even further."

Piam Brown Update



What's been happening at Piam Brown?

The children's oncology and haematology centre

With 59 new families coming through Piam Brown Ward so far this year their resources are being well utilised.

Fundraising for the Ward is used to maintain and renew facilities and equipment whilst also making possible regular trips and outings to bring joy to the children and their families who are receiving treatment or have been treated on the ward.

Next year's fundraising

Piam Brown is raising funds to redesign and equip the play room and teenagers' area that also doubles up as the school room. They also hope to fund ten specialised reclining chairs so that parents can sleep at their child's bedside whilst receiving treatment on the ward. Each chair costs £1,400.

Strictly Confidential

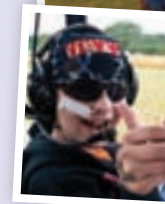

How your gifts have been used

Thanks to your generous donations, some of the items we have been able to purchase include:

£232.48 was spent on a new flat screen TV on the wall of the waiting area of the day surgery unit for gynaecology, breast and general surgery patients to give them the opportunity to relax and watch television whilst waiting for their surgery.

£1,581.98 from the Lahna Fund was used to fund two otoscopes to look into the ears of patients in the emergency department.

£4,042.47 was used for a low profile bed and 10 fans on the head injury ward.

£10,000 was raised by D3 who started fundraising in April this year for equipment vital in monitoring the side effects of chemotherapy much more closely. They have used the funds to buy 2 wall-mounted DASH monitors to observe patients' heart rate, blood pressure, oxygen saturation and respiratory rate; a portable ophthalmoscope to look into patients' eyes more closely; and an auriroscope on wheels to see into patients' ears. Congratulations to D3 on this achievement and thank you to everyone who kindly donated.

Wheelchairs

Southampton Hospital Charity has funded 38 brand new wheelchairs for the benefit of visitors and patients at Southampton General Hospital.

With only 15 wheelchairs the hospital porters at Southampton General Hospital have been struggling to manage effectively the transportation of patients, causing delays for patients and their treatment, and resulting in inefficiencies within the Trust.

The Portering Department became responsible for wheelchairs at the beginning of this year and has since been conducting daily wheelchair round ups to keep track of their location at the end of the day and prevent any further losses.

Steve Court, porter manager said: "The hospital desperately needed more wheelchairs. Porters were taking up to 30 minutes to find an available wheelchair to transfer patients and this resulted in delays to their treatment. The shortage also meant that staff often requested patients to be transferred on beds and trolleys, for expediency, that requires two porters as opposed to one porter to transfer a patient in a wheelchair.

"It's fantastic news that we will have more than triple the number of wheelchairs we have been managing with. Patients will now be transported more timely around the hospital, visitors who require wheelchair assistance to see their family and friends will also benefit and porters will be better utilised.

"We are extremely grateful to Southampton Hospital Charity for purchasing these much needed wheelchairs. Without a central budget for wheelchairs and with little surplus from



departmental budgets the Southampton Hospital Charity stepped in to buy these desperately needed wheelchairs. Over **£18,000** of the charity funds have been used to buy 10 large and 28 standard wheelchairs to accommodate our patient needs."

These new wheelchairs will carry the Southampton Hospital Charity logo and be held at convenient stations around the hospital where they can be accessed using a security card by designated members of staff.

Southampton Hospital Charity would like to thank the many other supporters, fundraisers and volunteers who have made a real difference across the hospital.

The Three Peaks Challenge consists of climbing Great Britain's three highest peaks all within 24 hours. Starting at Ben Nevis in Scotland, then onto Scafell Pike in England and finally Snowdon in Wales our team **travelled over 400 km**, climbed a total of 42km and despite exceptional temperatures they managed to complete the challenge in **23 hours and 46 minutes!**

Peter Holloway said: "With varying degrees of training completed beforehand and fitness levels within the team, the quest to complete the three peaks challenge actually proved to be more mentally challenging than physical. Our team ranged in age from 21 to mid 50's years and we all felt such a sense of achievement upon reaching the end."
